ANTIQUE FIRE-FIGHTING MUSEUM IN SCOTTSDALE, ARIZONA

Arizona's international fire-fighting museum started with a Christmas wish spoken aloud. Industrialist George F. Getz, Jr. seeing an old fire engine in a used car lot near Chicago, said to Mrs. Getz, "it would be fun to have one of those to drive kids around on."

On Christmas morning in his driveway a bright red 1924 American La France pumper, Christmas wrapped with ribbon and appropriate greeting card. The sparkling red fire engine that boys of all ages dreamed of and followed to the fires was all his. The Getz summer home at Lake Geneva, Wisconsin became an ideal play yard for George Getz, his fire engine and as many children as could

clamber aboard. Resultant publicity brought antique dealers, fire-engine buffs and old firemen to Winnetka. George began to buy — big pieces, small pieces, some hand drawn, some horse drawn.

The Getz collection of antique fire fighting apparatus and accessory equipment has grown and is growing into one of the largest collections of memorabilia in the world. Acquisitions came from Japan, France, Italy, Austria, Germany, Great Britain. In addition to the more than eighty pieces of wheeled stock there are hundreds of thousands of badges, medals, plaques, photographs, helmets, axes, bugles, uniforms.

Since the George Getz, Jr. family's move to Arizona part of the vast collection followed them and Mr. Getz founded the National Historical Fire Foundation and 'The Hall Of Flame' (registered trademark) housed the Arizona portion of the Getz museum. To enter the Hall Of Flame is to enter into an era when the fireman's ball was the highlight of the social season, leading citizens formed fire brigades and raced valiantly to be first on the scene of each new conflagration. Painstaking and meticulous restoration directed by septuagenarian Henry Crost reflects the ornate and lavish look of a decor to be seen












